Some would call her fiesty or hard-nosed, but all would agree she cared about her students.

Miss Reynolds taught 5th and 6th

Sporting her ever-present "school teacher" hairdo, Miss Reynolds maintained her great sense of humor, quick wit and a commitment to community long after retiring from teaching. Dedicated Staff Work to Enhance Music Education

Iowa Core has been a part of the education vocabulary in Iowa for the past few years. As a part of their own work with Iowa Core, music educators Sarah Jones, Emerson Elementary, and Amanda Freese, Francis Marion Intermediate School, have been working with the MISD k-12 music team to develop learning targets and "I can" statements. These will help direct instruction along a learning trajectory that will guide students through their music education career in MISD.

In addition, Jones and Freese have been implementing a formative assessment tool developed by Jones. This tool allows students to receive real-time feedback that helps them take ownership of their learning goals. This ownership provides students with valuable knowledge about what they need to know, what they do know, and what they still need work on for full mastery of the skills and concepts.

Jones and Freese have been selected to share their work



at the 2013 NAfME National In-Service Conference in Nashville, TN, on October 27-30. The title of their session is "I can... How targeted goals can enhance music education." They will also be attending the conference and bringing home a number of useful strategies to implement within the district's music program.

In addition to presenting nationally, Jones has led district-wide staff development on learning targets and both Jones and Freese were presenters this past year at the Grant Wood AEA "Cultivating Creativity Symposium" and the North Central Iowa Music Educators Association spring workshop.

MISD Meets Annual Progress Goals

Each year Marion Independent School District is required to set annual improvement goals based on the previous year's Iowa Assessment data. Goals are developed by the Comprehensive School Improvement Committee in the areas of reading, math and science. The developed goals then are presented to the school board for their consideration and adoption.

The following are the 2012-13 APR Goals;

- 1) As of May 2013, the class currently in grade seven will have shown an increase of more than 11 points on the Iowa Assessment Reading test as eighth graders as measured by the National Standard Score. Because the students in the eighth grade increased their National Standard Score by 22.2 points, MISD met their goal in the area of Reading.
- 2) As of May 2013, the class currently in grade four will have shown an increase of more than 14 points on the Iowa Assessment Mathematics test as fifth graders as measured by the National Standard Score. Because the students in the fifth grade increased their National Standard Score by 16.2 points, MISD met their APR Goal in the area of Mathematics.

3) As of May 2013, the class currently in grade eight will have shown an increase of more than 10 points on the Iowa Assessment Science test as ninth graders as measured by National Standard Scores. Because the students in the ninth grade increased their National Standard Score by 26.2 points, MISD met their APR goal in the area of Science.

Meeting APR goals for a district is something to celebrate. Thank you to all of the educators that impact our students everyday. Also thank you students for the effort that you gave in demonstrating your learning.

MHS Autism Teacher Plans "Connections Center"

At least 69 of the Marion Independent School District's 2920 students, have been identified as special needs. MHS autism teacher Annie Bradford's plan for a Connections Center will offer basic life skills and vocational training, skills development and confidence building for

students that are in need of the services.

The Marion Foundation recently committed \$5,000 to fund the purchase of Task Boxes containing activities and tools to help teach basic and vocational skills to students. But the Boxes are just one component of the new Connections Center. A room at the school will also be redesigned and equipped to resemble an apartment so students can learn to cook and care for themselves.

Two Outstanding Teachers to Retire from Vernon

Reading has been my passion ever since I was a little girl and my mother began taking me to the public library. I have devoured books ever since. To quote Thomas Jefferson: "I cannot live without books." When I was in grade school, I wrote a book and wanted to become an author. As an adult I made use of my music degree and

began teaching private music lessons, something I continued doing for 40 years.

I came into teaching language arts later in life but felt that teaching was a calling for me because I wanted to share my love of reading and writing with students, as I had been sharing my love of music. No profession demands more yet pays greater rewards than teaching. I have devoted the last 20 years to helping young adults discover the power of words and the pleasure of reading. For those who were already readers, I loved helping them discover new genres they wouldn't have otherwise chosen. And for those who hated to read (and there were many!), I worked diligently to help them find a book they could enjoy.

My classroom library was an essential tool. Nothing has given me more satisfaction in my career than to hear a student who hated reading at the beginning of the year say to me by June that he/she now enjoyed it. And to help non-writers discover that words give them a powerful voice. These are my greatest joys because those students will keep reading, keep writing, keep learning, keep experiencing all that literature has to offer, and hopefully instill the importance of reading and writing in their own children. What could be more important than that? I wanted my students to develop the skills necessary to be productive in the 21st century, to be informed citizens, articulate writers, and lifelong

learners. I had high expectations, and I know many a time students grumbled about it. I hope they all someday realize why I challenged them and pushed them so hard. I have loved being a teacher. I hope I have made a difference in their lives.

To all my former students, I want to say keep reading! Make the time. It's important. To all the parents, thank you for your support of my goals. To those who have children still in school, I say, there is nothing more important you can do to help your child than to be involved in their activities and keep them reading. Confucius said, "No matter how busy you may think you are, you must find time for reading, or surrender yourself to self-chosen ignorance." I say, reading is a lifeline. Let it lead you to knowledge of yourself, of others, and of the world. — *Mrs. Dodge*
