Loco Drone Curriculum

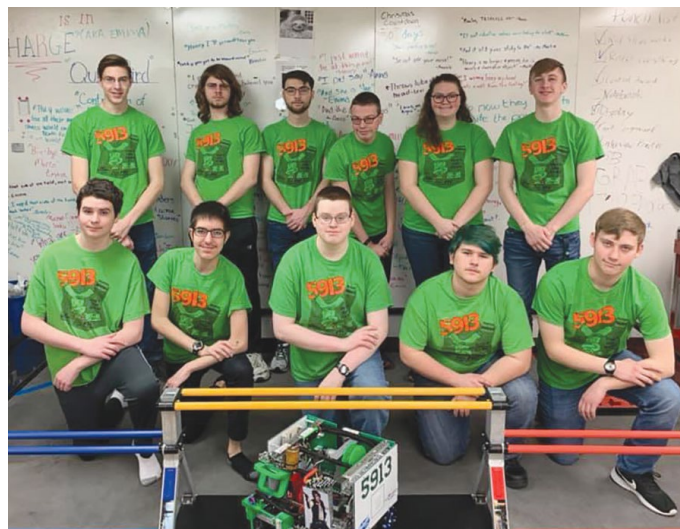
Heath Mueller – Vernon Middle School

Lt. Col. William Norman Reed



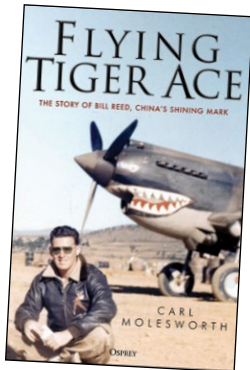
William Norman Reed, or "Bill," was Iowa's top flying ace in WWII, credited with 9 confirmed aerial victories and 9 confirmed enemy planes destroyed on the ground. His many achievements were recognized by awards including the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross and Oak Leaf Cluster, the Air Medal, the British Distinguished Flying Cross, and the Fifth and Sixth Order of the Chinese Cloud Banner.

Active in sports and serving as class president his junior and senior years, treasurer of Delta Sigma Delta and cofounder of the Mathematics Honor Society, Bill was well-liked and successful in both sports and academics. He acted in "As the Clock Strikes," a school play, his junior year. Bill also took an interest in a plane flown by local man Dan Hunter, founder of Cedar Rapids Airways Inc. His "Prophecy" in the Quill yearbook from Marion High School predicted "Aviator." Bill graduated from Marion High School in 1935 and graduated cum laude from Loras College in 1939.

Bill joined the Army Air Corps in February of 1940. He was invited to join a small select group of fighter pilots working for the Chinese government in its efforts against invading Japanese forces during WWII. The American Volunteer Group was nicknamed the Flying Tigers, due to the "shark face" painted on each plane.

After his service in China, Reed returned to Marion and joined several celebrities on a War Bond tour of the Midwest, ending in Hollywood. Bill returned to China in 1943 and was assigned to teach Chinese pilots to fly combat. In late summer of 1944, he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and served as Commander of the 3rd Fighter Group until his death in December 1944 when he tried to bail out of his aircraft during an air raid warning.

Although Bill died in combat before he was able to start a family of his own, his nephew Ed Reed (MHS Class of 1956) and Ed's wife Susan Reed (MHS Class of 1960) continue communication with the Flying Tiger Association, as well as maintaining a strong relationship with the Marion Foundation. The Reed family has donated the vast majority of Bill's Flying Tiger memorabilia to the Iowa Gold Star Military Museum, located at Camp Dodge.



Inspired by Bill's heroism, aviation author Carl Molesworth has written a biography titled *Flying Tiger Ace: The Story of Bill Reed, China's Flying Mark*. It draws heavily on Reed's own words, along with the author's deep knowledge of the China air war and years of research into Reed's life to tell his story. The book is available for purchase and can be checked out at the Marion Public Library. A book signing by the author to be held in Marion is in planning stages due to COVID-19. Additional information will be available on our website at marion-foundation.org as it becomes available.

Note: The last member of the American Volunteer Group/Original Flying Tigers died on February 5, 2020. His name was Frank Losonsky, ground personnel in the 3rd Squadron, known as the Hells Angels.

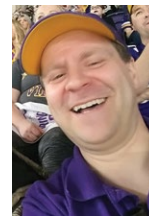

The first scholarship will be awarded in Spring 2021 to a student with an above average GPA showing service to their community and involved in school activities.

CARES Act Supports Charitable Giving for 2020

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act moved quickly through Congress and was signed into law by the President. A significant part of the CARES Act provides economic stimulus for businesses, but the Act also provides taxpayers with additional incentive for charitable giving.

For 2020, the Act allows individuals to take a charitable deduction of up to \$300 (\$600 for couples) – even if the taxpayer does not itemize. For those who do itemize, the CARES Act lifts the cap on cash donations from 60% of Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) to 100% of AGI, thus allowing donors to deduct more of their charitable cash contributions this year.

While the Act waives Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) for 2020, IRA owners who have attained age 70½ may continue to make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) from their IRAs. A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from one's IRA, payable to a qualified charity. A QCD excludes the amount donated from the IRA owner's taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. The maximum annual amount which can be given is \$100,000 per taxpayer (spouses are permitted to each give a maximum of \$100,000 provided that the participating spouse is at least 70½ and the QCDs are made from their respective IRAs). A QCD must be transferred directly from the IRA custodian to the charity by December 31. The charity must be a 501(c)(3) organization.

Kindergarten students have access to a variety of flexible seating options to meet their sensory and learning needs, also making the classroom more adaptive for individual and group activities.

Real Care Babies **Sandee Wolfe-Kerker - Vernon Middle** **School**

Five new Real Care babies allow 8th grade students to experience what caring for a baby is like as part of the Teen Living curriculum.

Creative Space for Journalism **Gretchen Mundorf - Marion High School**

The journalism team received funding to upgrade their broadcasting room and writers workshop space to a more professional environment that includes seating for interviews.

Students Seeking Science **Demonstrations** **Becky Knudson - Vernon Middle School**

A new storage cabinet was purchased for the 5th grade science classroom so students have individualized trays that group their lab materials to make classroom lab time more efficient.

MHS Band Bass Clarinet **Logan Vander Wiel - Marion High School**

A new Yamaha bass clarinet to replace the high school band's worn instrument.



Superintendent's Report

It is a pleasure to continue serving in the role of Superintendent for the Marion Independent School District. The past year has brought a number of celebrations and challenges, which are faced as opportunities for learning and progress.

The school year began with a focused effort in reviewing and updating the Strategic Plan. This process involved input from groups of students, staff, parents, community, and the Board of Education. We analyzed what makes MISD special and focused on which traits and characteristics are essential for our students as they prepare for life beyond their PK-12 grade education. This process led to updating our Mission, Vision, Goals, and Core Values, which guide short- and long-range District planning. The Vision "Own Your Future" involves *each child*, not just our seniors preparing for their future beyond graduation. It means that each student leaving kindergarten will be Future Ready, with the prerequisite academic and social-emotional-behavioral skills to be successful as a first grader. Our Mission to "Foster a community of learners in developing the knowledge and skills to be Future Ready" guides our focus in supporting each learner to develop and use their skills of creativity, critical thinking, collaboration, and communication.

At MISD, we take tremendous pride in community. We work to foster community in our classrooms, schools, district, and through critical partnerships within the greater Marion area. The end of the 2019-2020 school year has heightened our pride in and focus on community! MISD, like schools across the nation, faced many unique challenges in light of COVID-19. We left for spring break anticipating to return a week later. Unfortunately this was not possible. Our students and staff missed out on many milestones a typical school year would hold. With creativity and commitment by many, we reworked how these milestones could continue to be celebrated. MHS held the first-ever virtual induction ceremony for National Honor Society. Both MHSAP and MHS developed video productions to celebrate 2020 graduates. A drive-through parade for MHS Seniors provided an opportunity to show off their cap and gown and pose for photos. Although not traditional ceremonies, there were many smiles and memories made.

Despite our brick and mortar buildings closing in March, MISD staff continued to support students and families. Approximately 350 each of school breakfasts and lunches (700 total meals per day) were served. Teachers developed lessons for students to engage in from home, while also checking in

by phone or virtually with students and families. It has been a difficult time for so many, but we celebrate the dedication of our staff and community in meeting the needs of our students.

Quality learning has taken place at home and online over the past few months, but our mission to foster a community of learners involves face-to-face interactions. Right now, our buildings are empty, but by fall we hope these spaces will again be filled with relationships, routines, and traditions.

In late March, the Board of Directors of MISD decided to continue consideration of the facility assessment recently completed by Estes Construction. Architecture firms who specialize in K-12 assessment, planning, referendum support, and design were researched. The District solicited proposals, interviewed three firms, and ultimately selected OPN Architects to partner with on our Facilities Master Plan.

We are now in the process of analyzing how our spaces may (or may not) support learning in the 21st century, while also maintaining health and safety in light of COVID-19 for those involved. The result will be a roadmap of prioritized needs and funding options to guide District decisions in facility improvements and expansion now and into the future.

Those who work and learn in the District every day are aware of some needs and challenges, particularly at Marion High School, Francis Marion Intermediate, Starry Elementary and Thomas Park Field. One of the first steps in the process included an all-staff survey followed by virtual listening sessions.

An important next step will be to convene the Facilities Advisory Committee in July. This group of parents, staff, community members, students, and school board members will be tasked with setting priorities and shaping a long-range plan and timeline that balances needs and wants with available funding.

We want this process to be transparent and include as many voices as possible. In addition to the Facilities Committee, there will be opportunities later this summer and fall for the entire community to tour our schools, ask questions, and share your thoughts. These are your schools. Your input is vital. I hope you will join us in developing a plan that will shape the success of our students for years to come.
