# **Generous Gift of \$3.3 Million To Fund Scholarships**

The Marion School Foundation has received the largest scholarship donation in its history. A transformative gift of more than \$3.3 million was received from the estate of Marion High School alumna Ruth Drips. The

George, Gladys and Ruth Drips Endowed Scholarship Fund will distribute its first scholarships to members of the Marion High School class of 2024 in May.

"We are humbled by this incredible gift and look forward to honoring Ruth and her family annually when awarding scholarships to generations of Marion High School students," said Elisabeth Kissling, Marion School Foundation Executive Director. "I never had an opportunity to meet Ruth, but a note in the 1953 Marion High School Quill described her as having 'The mildest manner and the gentlest heart.' She obviously had a very generous heart as well."

Ruth Elaine Drips, 87, of Marion, Iowa, passed away on Sunday, February 5, 2023, at Summit Pointe Assisted Living Facility.

Ruth was born on April 22, 1935, in Cedar Rapids, lowa, the daughter of George and Gladys (Howland) Drips. She lived on a farm outside of Mount Vernon and through the third grade went to a one-room schoolhouse. Ruth graduated from Marion High School in 1953; Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri, in 1955; and the University of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in commerce in 1957. She worked in the office of Armstrong's Department Store in Cedar Rapids for 33 years. Ruth enjoyed reading, knitting, traveling, cooking, and being with her relatives and friends. Her passion was showing American Saddlebred horses and attending the World's Championship Horse Show in Louisville, Kentucky, for several years. Ruth was inducted into the Iowa Horsemen's Hall of Fame. She was also a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The George, Gladys and Ruth Drips Endowed Scholarship Fund is one of several generous scholarship and school enhancement funds administered by the Foundation. The scholarships provide meaningful assistance for Marion High School graduates as they continue their education. The school enhancement funds support education programs and projects for the benefit of Marion Independent School District students, schools, and the greater community.

Marion High School class of 1976 graduate, the late Dr. Henry J. "Harry" Carson, has endowed more than \$100,000 for scholarships with the Marion School Foundation. Carson's fund is directed to help students that are "intelligent in different ways," like his late brother Joseph "Walter" Collins Carson (MHS 1973). He felt students like Walter, who had superior intellect that wasn't

easily measured by normal curriculum and standardized tests, often fall through the cracks at school. The Dr. Harry Carson Scholarship will distribute its first awards to members of Marion High School class of 2024.

Carson wrote, "A student's potential – broadly defined as leadership, creativity, interests, ability, curiosity, or other qualities that suggest untapped gifts – may flourish if given an opportunity. Conventional measures can also be used (grades, class rank, athletic accomplishment, etc.), but students not accomplished in these areas should not

be disqualified if they are otherwise seen to have potential."

Dr. Carson died in Cedar Rapids at the age of 63 on May 14, 2022, from pancreatic cancer. He attended Oberlin College, Cornell College and the University of Iowa College of Medicine. He earned four board certifications in pathology, including forensic pathology which he practiced in Eastern Iowa. Harry was widely published in medical journals with original research. He was known for his love of music, photography, poetry and cats.

### Superintendent's Report

At MISD we recognize the critical importance of parent/family involvement in successful student outcomes. We have Board Policies, available on our website, that support the role of parents in your child(ren)'s education. For example, the 500s series policies outline a variety of requirements for students as

well as provide a policy specific to family engagement, while the 600s series detail the process for curriculum selection as well as the process to review any instructional materials. If you have any questions about how to review materials or are just seeking ideas for how to become more involved, feel free to reach out to the building principal, Assistant Superintendent, or Superintendent.

Facility upgrades continue at MISD! It is amazing to see so many new spaces take shape and for our students to experience the new facilities.

The **Marion Stadium**, at the Les Hipple Complex, has been a tremendous space this fall to host fall activities! The best part of using this space is seeing and hearing the pride in which our students hold in having an awesome venue in which to compete, perform, and call their own!

The renovations at **Francis Marion Intermediate** were nearing completion prior to a recent setback. We experienced significant water damage at FMI when the temporary roofing material over the section of the building being re-roofed unfortunately failed, sending a flood from the ceiling into a section of the building. The spaces that were impacted have had many ceiling tiles and large sections of carpet removed. In an effort

to return students to learning as quickly as possible, this space will remain in temporary condition (concrete floors and some open ceiling tiles). Larson Construction is now overseeing the restoration for this project. To minimize disruption to learning, much of the remaining repair will be scheduled during school breaks whenever possible. Despite this setback, the new secure front entry and new classroom wings, along with the renovated playground and parking area, are in use and serving our students and staff well.

**Parkview Elementary** is on schedule and progressing smoothly. The view changes regularly as Garling Construction continues to erect walls. The building will open to PK-2 students next fall, serving families who currently are within the Starry Elementary boundaries. With regard to the Starry site, a committee is currently working to identify potential uses for that site and will take recommendations to the School Board yet this school year.

Last but not least, the **Auditorium** will begin to quickly transform in the upcoming weeks as the walls for the storm shelter will be constructed first, followed by the larger auditorium structure. This venue will seat over 750, and will include a back of house similarly sized to the auditorium stage and allowing for various rehearsals to take place, in addition to serving as a storm shelter for the MHS site. If you drive by MHS over the next few weeks you will have a chance to see the auditorium take shape.

### **End-of-Year Charitable Gifts**

If you are thinking about end-of-the-tax-year gifts, please consider the Marion Independent School Foundation.

Remember that Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) from your Individual Retirement



Account (IRA) can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year, as long as certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from your taxable income, unlike regular withdrawals from your IRA.

QCD limits are generally \$100,000 for an individual or \$200,000 for a married couple. Funds are typically issued directly from the IRA custodian to the charity.

If you are interested in completing a QCD for the benefit of the **Marion Independent School Foundation** or any other charity, speak with your income tax preparer or financial advisor to address any questions and ensure eligibility.
